

when NSW school
pupils took an active role
in the war effort.

Using 1915-1918 sources students will undertake a range of genuine hands-on activities in an authentic 1900s school setting:

- write a postcard to a soldier
- · spin fleece into yarn
- · roll and fold bandages
- · weigh vegetables for fundraising.

Students will be immersed into the the home front during the First World War from a school child's perspective.

Stories of local boys who enlisted and young teachers at the front will be woven throughout the activities. Using 1915-1918 information, resources and pedagogy students will learn about 'The Great War':

- create a military camp model
- trace a map of the Gallipoli Peninsula
- recreate an Empire Day tableau
- practise cadet drill
- learn basic semaphore flags.

Through analysis and use of sources, students will develop historical skills and concepts: perspectives and interpretations; empathetic understanding, cause and effect, significance.

Patriotic tableau

Step into a 1915 photo

of a school Empire Day tableau of the countries of the Empire.

Spin wool

Spin fleece into yarn

using a drop spindle, to be knitted into socks and comfort items for the war front

Prepare bandages

Roll and fold bandages

as a part of the Junior Red Cross, to send to first aid stations at the front.

Write a postcard

to a soldier, showing empathy and support.

Key inquiry questions

- What is the nature and contribution made by different groups and individuals in the community?
- How and why do people choose to remember significant events of the past?

Source-based activities

Students will **use and analyse primary sources** to recreate aspects of 1915-1918 school life that supported the war effort.

The significance of and reason for each activity will be explained in the context of a 1900s classroom by educators in role as 1900s teachers.

Through **historical reenactment** and **immersion in the past** students will develop an understanding of:

- the origins and significance of ANZAC Day and
- the contribution of school children within the community.

Sources include The School Magazine, The Public Instruction Gazette, The Education Gazette, photographs and other images.
